

## **Preserve Your Professional Reputation**

[1] When you could not possibly say it better – copy the direct quote, put the language in quotation marks, and add a citation.

[2] If you paraphrase **but leave any 15 consecutive words unchanged** from the original – include quotation marks and add a citation.

[3] Even if you successfully paraphrase a passage and no direct quotes are needed – you must still include a citation to the original source so the reader knows this is not your own personal insight, but rather an observation made by someone else.

[4] When you cut and paste, carefully place all copied language into quotation marks and clearly indicate the source. Then change the font color so you can easily distinguish between your original writing and someone else's words.

[5] Insert footnotes as you go - at least one per paragraph - to remind yourself of the sources you have used. Wait until the final draft to properly format the citations and insert "id." or "ibid." where needed.
